## **Antique Appraisal Day**

On June 5th, the Trail Historical Society held its second annual Antique and Collectibles Appraisal Day at the Trail United Church. Mr. Al Bowen, respected appraiser from Vancouver, again provided attendees with interesting and entertaining information about the artifacts they brought with them.

One of the more unusual items was a large coffee grinder in the shape of a coffee pot from the 1930s, given as a promotional item to the owner of a local café in the 30s. It was valued at \$2500.

The highest appraised items were a pair of painted ceramic lamp bases from the 1860s that

originally were believed to have come from France. These beautiful objects were appraised at \$3,500 for the pair.

We would like to thank those volunteers and attendees, and, of course, Mr. Al Bowen for making the day a success.

### Museum Open

The Society's Museum in the Trail Memorial Centre is now open for the summer.

Deanna Hockley of Trail has been hired to look after the Museum with the assistance of a summer student employment grant from Human Resources Development Canada. Deanna will be with us until the end of August before returning to university in Edmonton.

### **HISTORY BITES:**

Did you know the first woman to manage a Canadian bank lived right here in Trail? On Nov. 20, 1957 Margaret Rowe became the first woman appointed in charge of a Canadian bank, the Bank of Montreal. On July 24, 1965 the East Trail Branch of the Bank of Montreal was opened, and Margaret was the Accountant-in-Charge. That title was changed to Manager on Nov. 1st, 1966. When Margaret retired from the Bank of Montreal on June 30, 1985, she had worked for the Bank of Montreal for forty-two years, ten months and six days.

### Trail Journal of Local History: Issue 2

Courtney Palsson, assisted by Jenny Cowell, has published the second issue of the Trail Journal of Local History.

Produced in the same format as the first issue, this work is 54 pages of interesting and enlightening stories of local history. Articles include "Charles Catalano on Music and



Ginger Goodwin", "The Company Store", and the work of architect William Frederick Williams. Other articles describe the work of pioneer photographer Frederick Steele, the historical value of Fire Insurance Plans, and naming of the City of Castlegar and other local places and

features. Finally, the origin of the Trail Smoke Eater hockey team name is clarified.

The Journal is a delightful and easy read and belongs on the bookshelf of everyone interested in our area's history. It is available for a modest \$8.00 at the LJ Bookstore, Crockett Books and from the Society's offices in City Hall.

# Sports Hall of Memories Update

Final touches are being made to the new display area in the Sports Hall of

Memories. Painting has commenced and the flooring and moldings will follow. The lighting has been installed and it looks great.

The first exhibit in the room will recognize the accomplishments of local athletes currently performing at the professional or national



level in hockey, baseball and women's softball. To date, Adam Deadmarsh,

Dallas Drake, Jason Bay and Lauren Bay have contributed items for the display. We hope to install the display in August.

As part of this project, we are pleased to report the Regional District Community Services Commission (Greater Trail) provided the Society with a grant from the Columbia Basin Trust Community Initiatives Program in the amount of \$2185 to purchase 10 mannequins to display jerseys, uniforms and clothing properly in the Sports Hall of Memories and the Museum. The mannequins will ensure these items are displayed in a pleasing manner and protect the clothing from damage.

# Heritage Funding in the West Kootenays

In the Fall of 2003, the Society requested the Regional District Community Services Commission (Greater Trail) provide financial support to the 3 heritage organizations in the region; ours, the Rossland Museum Association and the Beaver Valley and Pend d'Oreille Historical Society. The Commission has agreed to provide the societies with a grant in aid in the amount of \$5000 for 2004 to assist with their heritage endeavours. They have requested the societies determine how the funds will be spent and report back.

The initial meeting of representatives from the 3 organizations has been held and it is the consensus of the group the funds should be spent promoting our museums and activities to increase attendance and generate revenue. We are currently exploring ways and means to do this and will be meeting again shortly to discuss how best to proceed.

We are all very appreciative of the Commission's support of our efforts to preserve our local history.

### Museum Feasibility Study

Trail City Council has authorized the Society to proceed with a call for proposals from qualified firms to prepare a feasibility study for the establishment of a new museum and archives for the City. The Society appreciates Council's support of this initiative.

The current Museum in the Trail Memorial Centre is inadequate for our needs, is poorly located and has parking deficiencies. The Archives is housed in City Hall in 3 separate rooms

and is running out of storage space. In addition, having the Museum and Archives in separate buildings creates operational difficulties for the Society.

The Study will identify possible locations for a new museum and archives based on a number of preferred site selection criteria. It will also determine an optimum size for the facility, identify possible sources of capital funding, what partnerships are available in the community to make the project more

viable, and recommend an action plan to bring the project to a reality. This is the first major step towards getting a new museum and archives to showcase, protect and make available to the public our City's history in a meaningful and professional manner.

It is hoped Council will approve the selection of the preferred firm in August and the study can commence in September.

### Mike Buckna Inducted

On May 6<sup>th</sup>, noted Trail hockey star and hotel owner, Mike Buckna, was inducted into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame. Mike is known as the 'Father' of Czech hockey and is held in high esteem in the Czech Republic.

The ceremony was held in Prague, Czech Republic during the 2004 World Hockey Championships. Mike Buckna Jr. attended the ceremony as a guest of the IIHF to receive the honour on his Father's behalf. Mike passed away in 1996.

cataloguing and properly storing the archive collection of their Trail and area operations.

The collection is stored in a small room in their Esplanade offices. Most of the material relates to the development and operation of West Kootenay Power dating from its founding in 1898. The collection consists of correspondence, dam engineering plans and details, photographs and other corporate records.

The collection promises to be a valuable history of the development of power generation in the West Kootenay region and will be a significant addition to the public records of West Kootenay Power.

So, I thought I would look back to the Cominco Magazine to remember some of the men from Trail who served during World War II.




### "It Isn't Funny!

NO, IT isn't funny. Our cover, we mean, Even if you did get a giggle out of it, it isn't funny—not to Schicklegrubber!

Mendoza, famous English cartoonist, designed the poster reproduced on our cover. Our sales agents in Britain, Henry Gardiner & Sons, kindly forwarded it for our edification. It was drawn for use by the Imperial Smelting Works, England.

It is doubtful whether any war material has been more important, more vital to victory, more essential to the planning and development of the invasion, than zinc. It is in almost every conceivable item of a soldier's fighting equipment and the thousands upon thousands of tons of it that we have poured out over the last four years are now going to work where it can be most effective."



"Sgt. Harold Breeze, formerly of the zinc plant machine shop, was recently listed by the R. C. A. F. as missing following operations. Harold left the Company to enlist in May, 1942. His wife, and daughter Dawn, with whom he is pictured, are living in Nelson." (Cominco Magazine July, 1944 p.20)
