# From the Desk of the President

For over 15 years City Council has provided our Society with a significant grant to support the full time operation of our offices. In 2012, we entered into an agreement with Council that by 2014 the annual operating grant would equal the wages and benefits provided to our Museum and Archives Director. Last year the City grant was \$47,500. This year the Board agreed to increase the wage rate paid to the Director commensurate with her education and experience and the valuable service she provides to the Society. The Board requested Council increase our operating grant for this purpose to \$59,500 for 2015. Council has agreed to provide the Society with a grant of \$55,000. Despite this being less than was requested, the Board has

agreed to increase the wage rate as initially promised.

Thanks again to Council for their generous support of our Society.

Over the years we have heard horror stories of children of deceased parents clearing out homes in preparation for its sale. In many cases, material, records or photos that may hold historical value are disposed of. In hopes of countering this practice we have prepared a one page pamphlet that will be given to families making funeral arrangements, urging them to consider donating items that may be of historical interest to a local heritage group. We hope this will stem the tide of items we would like to have heading to the dump. Thanks to Bill Clark of Alternative Funeral & Cremation

Services for agreeing to help us with this initiative.

After 36 years at the helm, Joyce Austin has retired as Manager of the Rossland Museum. The Museum has hired Joelle Hodgins as her replacement. We recently met with Joelle to introduce ourselves and to begin developing the same close relationship we had with her as we had with Joyce.

### **Riverfront Centre Update**

Discussions were recently held with representatives of City Council regarding the timetable for the planning and design of the Riverfront Centre.

Council has prepared a four year action plan that identifies major projects they believe needs their attention during their term. In particular, the plan has prioritized projects they wish to undertake in the next year based on Council and City staff workload.

As a result, Council has decided to delay the planning and design of the Riverfront Centre until the Spring of 2016. It is estimated construction of the Riverfront Centre will not

commence until late Fall 2016 or early Spring 2017.

Council has requested City staff prepare a report for their consideration by this September that will identify the options available to design the facility and propose a schedule to proceed with the project.

We are disappointed the project will not be proceeding this year, however we will continue to develop our plans for the museum exhibits and to

formulate a plan to raise the funds necessary to create the museum galleries.

# Trail Historical Society Strategic Planning Session

In 2007, the Board prepared a strategic plan that was designed to guide the operations of the Society until 2012. The plan was not always followed and is now out of date.

With the pending construction of the new museum/archives and then a brand new era of operating these facilities, the Board felt a new strategic plan was in order. The plan will focus on the needs of the Society and its Board to prepare

for planning a new facility and changing how we operate.

# Trail Journal of Local History, Issue #5 Release


The fifth issue in our publication program of the *Trail Journal of Local History* was released in January and is currently available for retail sales.

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### 2015 Grant Applications

All applications for this year's boardapproved projects have been submitted to our usual funding sources for consideration. Our operational funding sources include:

- Canada Summer Jobs Program
- Community Gaming Grant (BC)
- BC Arts Council

Project funding this year was requested from the following organizations:

- -Columbia Basin Trust's Community Initiatives Program (new workstation)
- -Columbia Kootenay Cultural Alliance (strategic planning)
- LeRoi Community Foundation (2016 calendar sponsorship)

Grant requests this year total nearly \$25,000.





As mentioned in previous issues, the Trail Museum will remain closed for this summer in order to conduct a thorough inventory of the artifact and sports collections which is a necessary document that will inform our exhibit design process later in the year. The 2016 summer student will be responsible for this important project.

In addition to our annual operating grant generously provided by the City of Trail, publication and merchandise sales, as well as research and contract work (with Teck Metals Ltd. in particular), the THS is on track for another successful year. ### Trail Times Negatives Project—Phase Two

Seemingly the "never-ending project," the Trail Times negative collection is already proving a valuable asset to our growing list of archival resources. Joyce Austin, contract worker on this phase, wrapped up in mid-March, as grant funding for the project came to an end.

The project saw the creation of yearly indexes of retained negatives from the Trail Times collection that was salvaged from their building many years ago. The flood of 1969 destroyed the majority of negatives from that year and years prior, save a few stragglers from 1968. The collection runs until 1998. As digital technology became more prevalent, the use of film diminished.

You'll recall that Phase One involved retaining published images and culling their remaining duplicates, triplicates and often quadruplicates! It was a long process and one through which we've been working for nearly three years. Phase Two consisted of the creation of indexes of the retained images, the captions used to describe them, the publication date and, where noted, the photographer.

The documents created allow for keyword searching, which makes research in those years of the newspapers that much simpler, especially if a detailed article accompanied a photograph.

Our hardcopy collection of papers ends in 1986 and the kind folks at the Trail

Times have agreed to the transfer of the remaining 12 years to our collection. Last year, additional shelving was purchased to accommodate this enhancement.

Additionally, the transfer of the negative collection was formalized by Times staff and the images in their entirety are now legally the property of the Trail Historical Society.

We are delighted that an end to this arduous project is in sight. We must thank all those contract workers and summer students who spent hours on the project, as well as the Times for trusting us with this important collection.

#### 2016 Historic Calendar

The Board has once again agreed to continue with our successful archival calendar program. The 2016 historic calendar will be hitting the press by this summer, with the product available by the fall.

We hope to attain a small amount of calendar sponsorship for this issue, in the hopes we can continue to rely on our generous supporters to carry on this popular program.

We found the ideal count to be three hundred for last year's issue and we were nearly able to break even based on sales.

We feel this is a unique product to our community and makes fantastic use of our photograph collection, which grows annually.

It is hoped one-third of project costs can be covered by sponsorship.

The calendar is designed locally by Burntstick Design and printed, as always, by our friends at Hall Printing.
